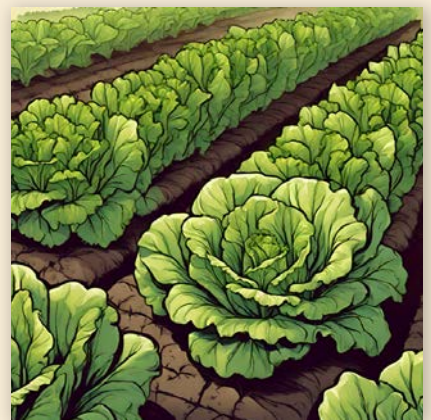
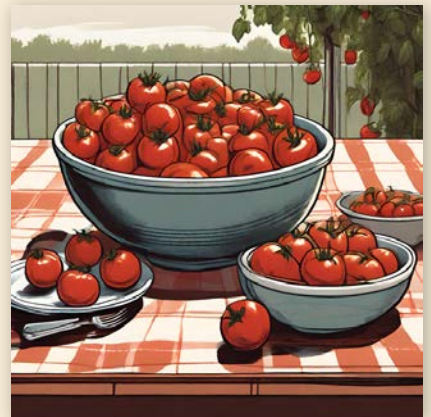

Delight Your Family & Friends with Vegetable Gardening Greeting Cards

You can turn these beautiful Vegetable Gardening ArtPrints into greeting cards—it's simple, it's fun, and the cards will be truly meaningful to your recipients, because each card depicts a variety of hydrangeas that evokes the essence of their beauty. And this kit includes a list of materials needed, with instructions, so it's easy for you to make these custom greeting cards yourself!

And the insides of the cards are left blank for you—no canned messages—so that you can personalize your greeting to each recipient.

All you need to create these greeting cards on your own home printer is cardstock paper and envelopes. That's it (well, you also need a pen for writing your messages and addressing your envelopes ... and stamps to mail them). Easy, peasy!

Materials Needed

- Printable blank cards and envelopes: You need 8 1/2" X 11" cardstock paper that is print friendly. Each sheet will print one greeting card (when folded in half), and white paper is best to crisply display the images that you'll print. Please check out this [Greeting Cards and Envelopes Set](https://amzn.to/41u5mIn) (<https://amzn.to/41u5mIn>) — includes supplies for creating and mailing 30 cards; if you need to send more cards, increase your order quantity of sets. This cardstock is scored where you need to fold the cards—making it easy to create a professional, clean look.
- Alternative envelopes: The recommended [Greeting Cards and Envelopes Set](https://amzn.to/41u5mIn) (<https://amzn.to/41u5mIn>) includes white cardstock paper (which you'll want for optimal presentation of images) and matching white envelopes. If you want to jazz up your envelopes for a more festive look, try these [Dark Red A9 Envelopes](https://amzn.to/3RuiEzH) (<https://amzn.to/3RuiEzH>) that are 5 3/4" X 8 3/4"—perfect for fitting your white greetcards to mail, and no extra postage is needed. You can order 25, 50, 100, 250, 500, or 1,000 of these envelopes now. Or choose another color to convey your own style.

Instructions

- For the greeting cards: Print in full color—print the following 9 pages singlesided. Test first on plain paper, so you don't waste your card stock paper—and print this instruction page on plain paper, if you want, to guide you. Most printers will require that you adjust the printer settings to accommodate "heavy" paper stock. Print as many copies of each page, to fulfill how many cards you want to create. After printing, fold each sheet in half where the paper is scored—with the images on the outside—to create your cards. Write personal notes inside the greeting cards to your recipients.
- For the envelopes: The envelopes can be manually addressed—or printed with your return address and the addresses of your recipients ... if your printer can accommodate the envelope size. Or, you can affix returnaddress labels that are personal to you and handaddress the outside of the envelopes to the recipients. After personalizing your messages to each recipient on the inside the greeting cards, insert corresponding cards into the matching recipient envelopes. Seal, affix with an appropriate stamp, and then you're ready to mail!

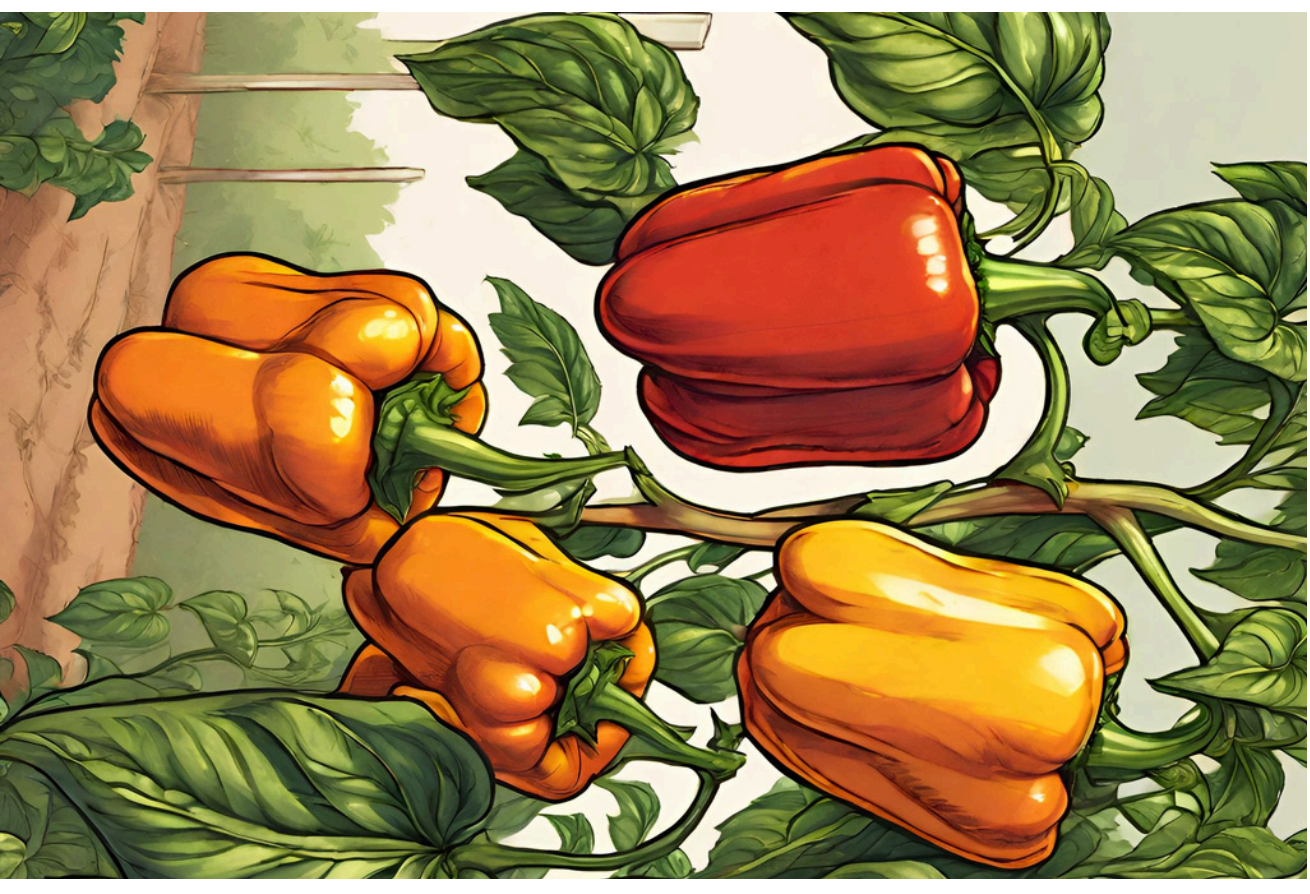

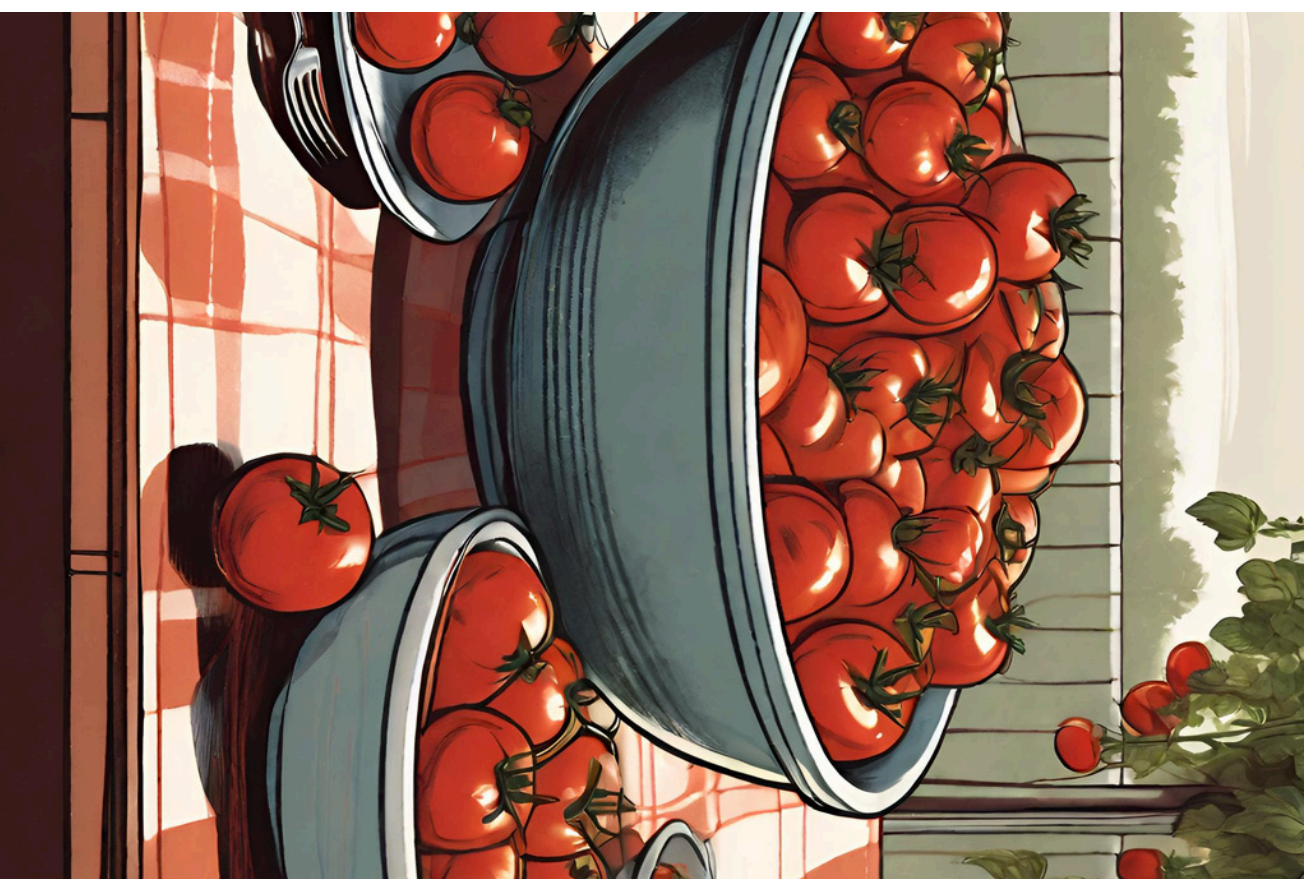
